Report of the Trustees

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018.

Constitution

The Scottish Beekeepers Association is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO), registration no. SCO 09345.

Structure

The activities of the Association are ultimately controlled by the Trustees, who meet regularly throughout the vear

Trustee recruitment

Trustees are appointed, or reappointed, at the Annual General Meeting, held in March each year.

Objectives and activities

The organisation's purposes are to support honeybees and beekeepers, to improve the standard of beekeeping, and to promote honeybee products in Scotland through:

- -The advancement of education in relation to the craft of beekeeping;
- -The advancement of the heritage, culture and science of beekeeping; and
- -The advancement of environmental protection by conservation of the honeybee. To promote beekeeping and encourage all interested in the art and science of beekeeping, stressing the benefits that beekeeping confers on agriculture and horticulture

Promotion of Beekeeping

The SBA has continued to work throughout Scotland to fulfil its purposes of supporting honey bees and beekeepers, improving standards in education and promoting honey bee products. Interaction with SBA members and the public has continued through the developing SBA website, social media sites such as Facebook & Twitter and the Scottish Beekeepers' Interactive Forum. For members, the SBA monthly magazine, The Scottish Beekeeper, provides current beekeeping information, and the Moir Lending Library, consisting of some 5,000 beekeeping books, provides a unique beekeeping resource. Digitisation of the Moir Library catalogue and five supplements has been completed and they are available on the website. Ninety years of copies of the Scottish Beekeeper has also been digitised and is available in searchable form on the website.

SBA presence at national and local horticultural, agricultural and honey shows has provided excellent opportunities for public engagement. In addition the SBA continues to attend and encourages the Affiliated Beekeeping Associations (ABA's) to attend several of the Royal Highland Education Trust's (RHET) open farm days. these are aimed at teaching children about food sources and RHET has agreed to include beekeeping in the agenda.

Education

The SBA is committed to advancing and improving the standard of beekeeping in Scotland. To implement this, a broad ranging education programme has run throughout the year. Modular written examinations were held in March and November and during the summer, practical examinations at Junior, Basic, Intermediate and Apiarian (Advanced) levels were taken. It is the aim of the SBA to have all beekeepers in Scotland at least at Junior or Basic standard. 70 candidates passed their Basic Beekeeping examination this year, 7 Juniors passed the Junior Beekeepers examination and 76 sat modular examinations. 3 passed their Intermediate practical, 3 passed their Apiarian & went on to become SBA Expert Beemasters. There was also a Microscopy exam in March passed by 5 candidates. In addition 7 applicants gained their Beekeeping Trainer Certificate.

Report of the Trustees (continued)

Education (cont.)

Focussing on improving knowledge regarding bee health, information days were promoted by the SBA working with the Scottish Government to run two bee health days. The SBA has also worked with Moray Beekeeping Association to run their Healthy Bees programme, a series of two day courses held throughout Scotland aimed at improving beekeeping knowledge and skills and preparing beekeepers for the SBA practical and module examinations

The annual Convention, held in Glasgow in conjunction with Glasgow and District Beekeepers Association, who were celebrating their centenary, hosted four speakers.

The annual lecture tour, instituted so that beekeepers in more distant locations could benefit from a notable lecturer, was successfully undertaken by Marin Anastassov NDB of Gloucestershire Beekeepers, who gave 7 lectures throughout Scotland.

Conscious of the need to involve young people in beekeeping, we have continued to develop ways to engage with them in schools. A series of seven video clips, aimed at children, outlining the various aspects of beekeeping has been produced and published on the SBA website, YouTube & Vimeo. A further two videos have been included on other beekeeping subjects.

Instructional courses including on honey harvesting and skep making, were well attended and successfully delivered. A team of SBA members also attended a Citizen Science weekend at the Easter Bush Science Outlook Centre at Roslin and participated in Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) analysis of bee and bee associated organisms to determine whether potentially pathogenic trypanosomes were affected by the bees use of propolis. Input data from project being run by one of the Dick Vet school students on the effectiveness of various varroa treatments was also analysed.

In order to establish a Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) beekeeping qualification, the SBA and Inverness-shire Beekeeping Association have co-operated with the University of the Highlands and Islands (UHI) in preparing three beekeeping courses that can be delivered by schools and colleges at N5 level. This course will be trialled in the forthcoming school and college terms.

Research projects.

At the University of Aberdeen the SBA is part-funding a PhD student, researching "Establishment of an off-host culturing system for the honey bee mite Varroa destructor".

Meetings

Four Trustees' meetings for discussion and decision making were held. The AGM in March and the Members' Discussion Forum in November, allowed business to be conducted and provided opportunities for beekeepers to meet and exchange ideas and information.

At national level the SBA contributed to meetings with the Scottish Government, Council of National Beekeeping Associations of the UK and Ireland (CONBA), Food Standards Scotland and the National Diploma in Beekeeping Board.

Governance

The document 'Recruitment and Retention of Trustees' was produced for discussion during the year.

Local Associations

43 Affiliated Beekeeping Associations (ABAs) have now signed up as members of the SBA. We are pleased that, so many ABAs have chosen to affiliate themselves with us.

Development

The SBA is very conscious that even if honeybees have changed little over the millennia, beekeepers certainly have. The trustees, whilst continuing to cater for the needs of traditional beekeepers, are seeking to engage with the modern beekeeper and to meet the expectations of the wider community and regulators.

Development (cont.)

New Corporate Governance and budgeting procedures have been introduced and we have published a paper 'Resources for Beekeepers' which identifies the support that the SBA can deliver to a member throughout their beekeeping life. The Board of Trustees is determined to meet the challenges the future holds. We are encouraged to see that the Board's vision of meeting the challenges of the new millennium is generally shared by the membership when we meet in general meetings.

1 Basis of accounting

The Moir Library Collection

(a) The Moir Rare Book Collection

value £324250.

The collection is held in the National Library of Scotland, Rare Books' Section, Edinburgh. It consists of 250 items. The collection is open to SBA members and all other visitors, on request to the National Library.

Details of the collection are online.

(b) The Moir Lending Library

value £34,250

The Collection is held in the Edinburgh City Libraries, Fountain Bridge branch, Edinburgh. It consists of more than 5,000 books and pamphlets. The collection is open to all SBA members who may borrow books. Other beekeepers and members of the public can visit and borrow or use books, for example for research, by arrangement with the SBA Library Officer.

The Collection's catalogues have been digitised and are available online.
